Wisler Receives PASBO's Gary E. Reeser Memorial Award

On March 22, Stan H. Wisler, PRSBA, CFO/Director of Management Services at Montgomery County IU #23, was awarded the Gary E. Reeser Memorial Award at PASBO's 62nd Annual Conference and Exhibits in Pittsburgh. Wisler is the 54th recipient of the award.

Wisler joined PASBO in 1982 when he first started his school business career as a Business Office Supervisor at Methacton School District. After serving as business manager at a few districts between 1984 – 1992, Wisler landed at Souderton Area SD as Director of Business Affairs. There, he managed a self-insured healthcare program for the district at a time when many districts were not considering this option.

In 2005, Wisler moved to Montgomery County IU #23 (MCIU) as their CFO and created a county-wide consortium for self-insured healthcare. His efforts have saved the LEAs in Montgomery County millions of dollars. Wisler has also successfully coordinated the purchase and renovation of numerous facilities, most recently with the renovation of the former MCIU office building in to a thriving Early Learning Center for disadvantaged youth in the Norristown area.

Wisler was on the PASBO Board of Directors from 2008 – 2016,

ultimately serving as President in 2014 – 15. He is also active on various committees. On a regional level, Wisler is a member and former President (2008-09) of the Delaware Valley School Business Officials.

According to MCIU Executive Director Dr. John J. George, "Stan truly exemplifies the award criteria of professionalism, leadership and innovation. He is a very well respected member of the school business community. He has stepped into leadership positions to provide support to his fellow colleagues and to further the collaborative spirit among school entities. Stan is a clear example of a selfless leader who is willing to help a colleague wherever support is needed."

The Gary E. Reeser Memorial Award is PASBO's highest honor and is given annually to a member or members who are selected on the basis of professionalism, superior job performance, development of innovative ideas and contributions to the profession of school business management. The award was created in 1977, following the tragic death of Central Susquehanna Intermediate Unit #16 Deputy Executive Director Gary Reeser. Reeser was also PASBO's Vice President at the time.

submit for either initial or renewal registration is provided in an online form format. If you need help with compiling your CEU history, review the information on finding your CEU History.

Once you complete the process and become registered, PASBO makes sure your LEA is aware of the commitment you have demonstrated by notifying them your achievement. You are then authorized to carry the applicable designation of PRSBS, PRSBO or PRSBA after your name for the next four years. Doing so shows all others you care enough to continue to learn more about your profession, to share what you have learned with others, your commitment to excellence!

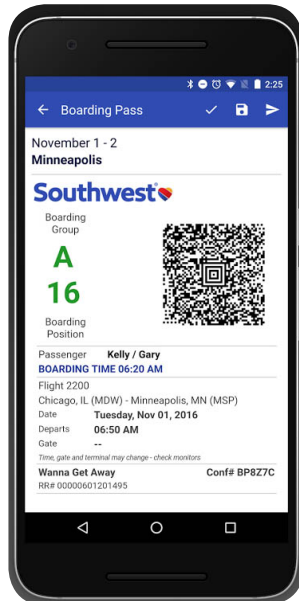

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It Is Time to Start Preparing for Next School Year

The last thing on your priority list right now is getting ready for the next school year, but planning early will limit the stress that comes with opening a new school year. We all live for the deluge of phone calls and the parent letters, and of course, the last minute enrollments that completely change our bus routes. Below are some of the items that you should address early in order to prepare for your opening.



PICK A DATE TO START YOUR ROLL OVER AND STICK TO IT.

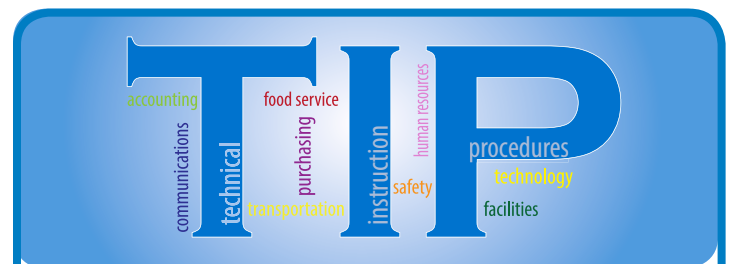
1. Run your student roll over. Coordinate the roll over with your IT Department if you are networked to a student accounting system.
2. Move students listed at a non-public school which they are no longer eligible for due to their grade and place them into a holding area (school unknown). Remove them from their previous bus.
3. Assign bus stops to students who have been promoted to a new school.
4. Print a list of non-public students by school.
5. Send a letter to non-public schools explaining that the enclosed student list for the next school year includes students advanced one grade. Have them indicate any student on the list who will not be returning or who will be repeating a grade. Request a list of all new students with complete information on each. You will also need a copy of the (non-public school) calendar for the next school year. Inform them of days you will not be providing transportation (national holidays) and how many early dismissals you will provide (same number as your district). Inform the school that on the remaining early dismissal dates transportation will not be provided. Set a date when you want all this information returned to your office, usually by June 1st. Any information received after August 1st will not guarantee bus service for the opening of school. Establish a method (fax, e-mail, etc.) to receive updates and corrections of the original list.
6. Work with your Special Education Department to update transportation for special needs students. Changes can cause major revisions in routes, so this information is needed early.

7. Set a date for your drivers to do their dry runs. Make sure you have time to make corrections before you put it out to parents.

8. Establish the date you are planning to notify your students' parents of the bus information and by what means, i.e. postcards, letters or newspaper ads, student accounting system, i.e. Skyward.

This may not cover all of the preparations for a start up, but it will give you a good idea for needed planning. By starting early you spread the workload out over several months and you will anticipate problems before they occur. Just remember you will get through this and you will have time to deal with "the bus ride is too long" or "I can't see my children at the bus stop from the house."

Annual Bid and Quote Increase

The Department of Labor and Industry is required by the Public School Code 24 P. S. §§ 1-120, 7-751 and 8-807.1 to publish changes (usually in December) to the base amounts triggering the requirement for public bids and written/telephonic quotes effective January 1 of the following year. For 2017, the "bid and quote" threshold has increased as follows:

- \$19,700 and above – requires bidding
- \$10,700 to \$19,699 – requires three quotes
- Under \$10,700 – no bids or quotes required

Communicating Your Budget to the Community

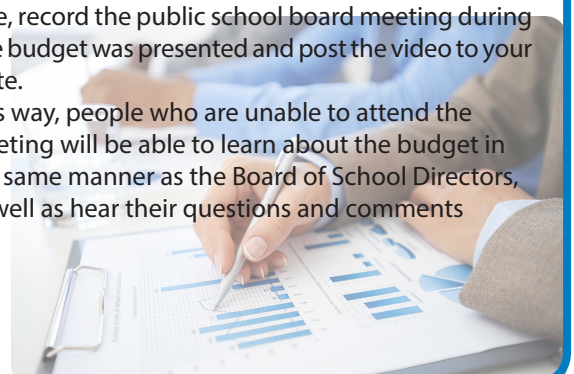

School budgets can be complex and nuanced, and your public will have varying degrees of comfort with multifaceted financial information. Here are some tips to help communicate this vital information with a variety of community constituents:

- ♦ Include a summary that also touches on bigger-picture budget goals
- ♦ Provide historical points of reference to frame this year's budget with past budgets
 - ♦ Incorporate some overall district financial trends, such as revenue percentage (local, state, federal) and school tax as a percentage of community personal income
- ♦ Present budget information alongside other district data trends (ex: community demographics, enrollment, educa-

tional statistics) to place the annual budget into a more complete picture of the district

- ♦ Whenever relevant, communicate the data visually, as a graph or an illustration.
- ♦ If possible, record the public school board meeting during which the budget was presented and post the video to your district site.
 - ♦ This way, people who are unable to attend the meeting will be able to learn about the budget in the same manner as the Board of School Directors, as well as hear their questions and comments
